Chairperson's Report

This year we were delighted to welcome Sweet Louise's CEO Philippa Reed and Support Co-ordinator Jo Harris as well as Metavivor Terre Nicholson to the BCAC Committee, allowing us to sharpen our focus on advanced (metastatic, secondary or stage 4) breast cancer.

We have worked hard to improve access to important breast cancer medicines throughout the year by encouraging PHARMAC to rapidly progress applications for breakthrough medicines T-DM1 (Kadcyla) and palbociclib (Ibrance). BCAC has submitted formal applications to PHARMAC for funding for nab-paclitaxel (Abraxane), fulvestrant (Faslodex) and everolimus (Afinitor). We also submitted a joint request with the Breast Cancer Foundation NZ (BCFNZ) for PHARMAC to extend the breadth of funding for pertuzumab (Perjeta). All of these medicines are important elements in oncologists' toolkits for effectively treating the various sub-types of breast cancer in a way that suits the unique physiology of everyone diagnosed with breast cancer.

It's great to see Metavivors NZ on the rise as a genuine representative voice and force for positive change in New Zealand breast cancer. This awesome group of NZ women with advanced breast cancer has stepped forward to ask for funded access to the medicines that can give them longer, better lives. In a march to Parliament organised by Metavivors, two petitions, for Ibrance and Kadcyla, were presented to MPs on 16th October with the message *Our Lives Matter*. The petitions attracted substantial media attention and the women explained what an extra two years of life means for them and their whānau. Women are now being forced to decide whether to fundraise, cash in their retirement funds or sell or mortgage their homes to be treated with modern drugs. The harsh reality is that without the benefit of medicines that are freely available in other developed countries these women must accept that they are likely to spend less time with their loved ones, doing their jobs and living their lives.

Seventeen MPs received the petitions from the women, who were supported by their family, whānau and friends. The petitions were warmly received and have been referred to parliament's Health Select Committee. Malcolm Mulholland, husband of march organiser Wiki Malton, also presented a request that the Health Select Committee and Māori Affairs Select Committee conduct an investigation into PHARMAC – its funding, processes and culture, and the impact of the failure to fund medicines on New Zealanders.

A powerful report released this year, *I'm Still Here*, from BCFNZ showed New Zealand women whose breast cancer advances only live 16 months on average, compared to two to three years or more overseas. Length of life following a diagnosis of breast cancer is closely correlated to the number of systemic treatments received. Many

New Zealand women receive none while only 15% receive more than three, while many more treatments are provided overseas. Our five-year survival rates of 15% for non-Māori and only 5% for Māori are worse than other countries and this gap is widening. One quarter of people with advanced breast cancer who were surveyed for the report do not believe that their medical team is doing all they can to help keep them alive and give them a good quality of life. Only one third of them have good control over their symptoms and most said that their quality of life would be most improved by access to better treatments and relief from financial stress.

Results from a University of Waikato study released earlier this year showed serious inequities in breast cancer incidence and outcomes for Māori and Pasifika women. Pasifika women are diagnosed with breast cancer at a younger age, are more likely to have an aggressive form and are twice as likely to die from breast cancer within five years than NZ European women. Māori women are less likely than non-Māori to be diagnosed through mammographic screening, or to receive chemotherapy, Herceptin or surgery and have a 76% higher 5-year death rate. Women over 70 are also less likely to be treated with surgery, chemotherapy, Herceptin or radiotherapy. Although the research findings from both the BCFNZ and Waikato studies were sobering, they demonstrated the value of the breast cancer registers maintained for so long by BCFNZ and the power of collaboration among researchers and funders. These results and others like them give us the sound evidence base that we need to back up our calls for change.

BCAC focused on strategies to overcome these inequities and the need to provide better funding for breast cancer medicines in our annual briefing for the Minister of Health. Unfortunately the Minister David Clark declined to meet us as he has delegated women's health matters to Associate Health Minister Julie Anne Genter (Green Party), so we met and briefed her as well as Health Select Committee Chair Louisa Wall (Labour) and Michael Woodhouse (National).

BCAC responded to consultations by PHARMAC on consumer input, by the National Ethics Advisory Committee on National Ethics Standards for Health and Disability Research, and by the Health Research Council, Ministry of Health and Ministry for Business Innovation and Employment on the New Zealand Health Research Strategy.

BCAC's committee members continued to keep their knowledge up to date by attending and participating in research conferences including the San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium, the Breast Cancer Research Summit associated with the NZ Society for Oncology annual meeting, the Indigenous Peoples and Cancer Conference, and the Annual Scientific Meeting of Breast Cancer Trials (BCT) (Australia and New Zealand) as well as BCT refresher training on clinical trials, and the Asia-Pacific Oncology Stakeholders Forum.

BCAC's *Step by Step* support pack continued to receive positive feedback from recipients and health professionals and has now been updated and revised, ready for a 4th edition to be printed soon.

Finally, heartfelt thanks to all our member groups, who work at every level to make life better for New Zealand women with breast cancer. The network that underpins BCAC, extending from community-level support groups to the big nationwide organisations, constantly 'keeps it real' for us and allows us to speak with an authentic voice. The willingness of New Zealand women with breast cancer and their supporters to tell their stories and to speak up about their concerns is a positive and powerful force for change.

Providing a voice for those diagnosed with breast cancer

- Helped raise the voice of women with breast cancer through BCAC media releases and media interviews. Interviews included Chairperson Libby Burgess and committee member Irene Kereama-Royal on the urgent need for better treatment, outcomes and equity for women with advanced breast cancer and Māori and Pasifika women
- Fay Sowerby, BCAC secretary, is a member of the Breast Cancer Trials Fundraising and Communications Committee
- BCAC Chairperson Libby Burgess is an Affiliate Member of Breast Cancer Trials
- BCAC Deputy Chairperson Emma Crowley is a member of the Consumer Advisory Panel of Clinical Trials New Zealand
- BCAC supported many women as they negotiated the health system to secure timely and appropriate treatment and care

Improving access to world class treatment and care

- Applied for PHARMAC funding of three medicines that would make a tremendous difference to the lives of people with advanced breast cancer Afinitor (everolimus), Abraxane (nab-paclitaxel) and Faslodex (fulvestrant)
- Represented New Zealanders with breast cancer at key international conferences including the Asia-Pacific Oncology Stakeholders Forum in Singapore at which Chairperson Libby Burgess presented on BCAC successfully getting Herceptin funded in New Zealand; and also the Breast Cancer Trials Annual Scientific Meeting in Sydney
- Met with and provided a written briefing to Associate Minister of Health Hon. Julie Anne Genter, National Health Spokesperson Hon Michael Woodhouse and Health and Wellbeing Caucus member Hon. Louisa Wall
- Our Ministerial Briefing focused on a number of key breast cancer issues in New Zealand, particularly the desperate need for increased medicines access and the urgent need to address inequities in breast cancer screening, treatment and outcomes for Māori and Pasifika women
- Also provided our written Ministerial Briefing to the Minister of Health Hon. Dr David Clark, cc the Prime Minister Rt Hon. Jacinda Ardern and the then Acting Prime Minister Hon. Winston Peters.

- Met with Ministry of Health officials to follow up on a range of issues including those raised in our Ministerial Briefing
- Provided a submission to the Health Select Committee and wrote to the Minister of Health calling for the introduction of Intra-operative Radiotherapy into the public health system as a highly effective treatment option in selected cases of early-stage breast cancer
- Made a submission to PHARMAC on their Consumer Voice consultation, seeking reforms that would lead to greater speed, transparency and integrity of decision making as well as consumer input at all steps of the process
- Communicated with PHARMAC representatives to discuss the urgent need for better access to new and innovative medicines
- Met with pharmaceutical companies to encourage them to apply for registration and funding for key breast cancer drugs and to offer their products at affordable prices
- Made a further joint submission with BCFNZ to PHARMAC to extend funding for Perjeta (pertuzumab) to all patients currently being treated with trastuzumab for metastatic breast cancer.

Improving outcomes for Māori and Pasifika women

- Liaised with Māori and Pasifika women affected by breast cancer and related advisory groups
- Highlighted the poorer outcomes of Māori and Pasifika women with breast cancer
- Appealed to BreastScreen Aotearoa, the Ministry of Health's Cancer Team and the Minister of Health to achieve real and significant improvements in the engagement of Māori and Pasifika women as well as the speed of detection and treatment for those with breast cancer
- In our Ministerial Briefing, provided to the Prime Minister and a number of Ministers and MPs, we recommended a range of measures to help address inequity in breast cancer screening, treatment and outcomes for Māori and Pasifika women
- In our submission on PHARMAC's Consumer Voice consultation we called for processes that are inclusive of people of diverse cultures including Māori and Pasifika people
- Met with Auckland District Health Board and Counties Manukau District Health Board representatives to discuss our concern regarding the non-delivery of chemotherapy treatment for women in South Auckland, Waitemata and Northland.

Moana's hura kōhatu (unveiling)

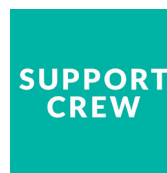
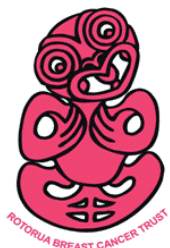

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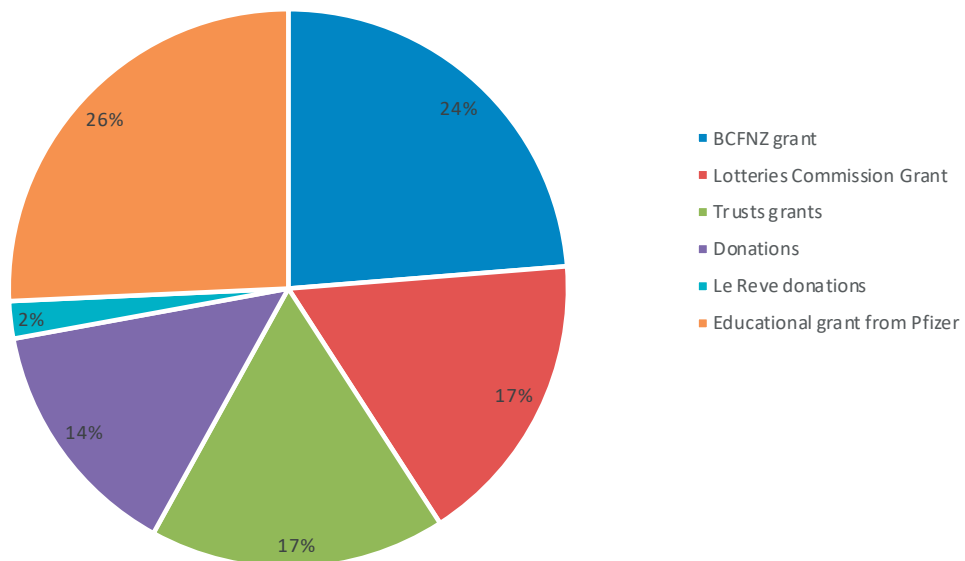

BCAC Revenue to 31 March 2018



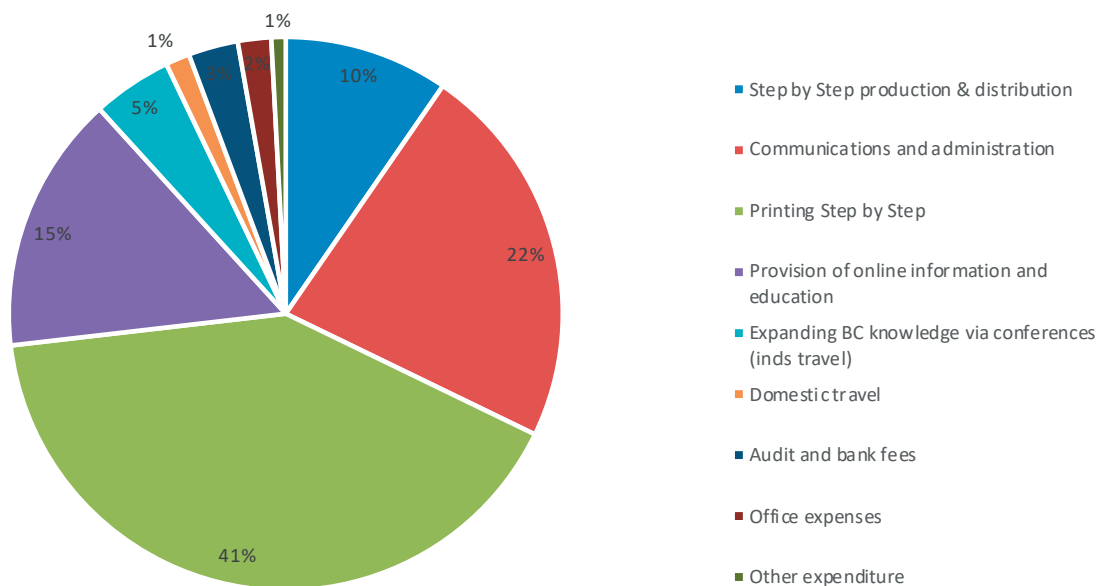
